

- One of five children




Education

Family Troubles



John Keats

- Sibling died in infancy
- Father died at age 8
- Moved in with Grandparents
- Mother died when he was 14
- Brother Tom died
- Brother George moved



Financial Troubles



- Richard Abbey became guardian
- Poetry not a job for the middle class
- Poverty prevented marriage
- Grandfather died
- Vague will
- Grandmother died 1814

Fanny Brawne

- Met in 1818
- Soon after became engaged
- Couldn't afford to support a wife
- Kept engagement a secret
- Last saw her in September 1820

Poetic Career


- Started 1814- Imitated Elizabethan poets

- Settled in Hampstead




Ode to the Nightingale

Still, still to hear her tender-taken breath,


Tuberculosis Develops by Stages



Every person is born with healthy lungs



Many of us become infected from other people as we grow up.



The first infection usually heals. The person is well and no germs escape from his lungs. It is important to find this first infection in children.



If later a person becomes infected again, the serious disease tuberculosis may begin. The germs that escape from the lungs are likely to infect others.



If tuberculosis is not discovered early, the disease spreads. A hole (cavity) may form in the lung which is an incubator of germs that escape and menace everybody who comes in contact with the sick person.

Death

- Died peacefully in bed
- Two year battle with Tuberculosis
- Died 1821, 26 years old
